### Patient Information

Your patch test result indicates that you have a contact allergy to dibutylphthalate. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching and fluid-filled blisters.

### Where is dibutylphthalate found?

Dibutylphthalate is a plasticizer. It is also used as an additive to adhesives and printing inks.

### How can you avoid contact with dibutylphthalate?
