Patient Information

Your patch test result indicates that you have a contact allergy to 1,3-diphenylguanidine. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is 1,3-diphenylguanidine found?

1,3-diphenylguanidine is the primary and secondary accelerator in the vulcanization of rubber and is found in the rubber industry.
