Patient Information

Your patch test result indicates that you have a contact allergy to betamethasone-17,21-dipropionate. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is betamethasone-17,21-dipropionate found?

Betamethasone-17,21-dipropionate is a widely used topical anti-inflammatory—a corticosteroid used in both prescription and non-prescription topical ointments, creams, lotions, gels, foams, or aerosol sprays.

How can you avoid contact with betamethasone-17,21-dipropionate?

Avoid products that list any of the following names in the ingredients:

- 9-fluoro-11β
- 17,21-trihydroxy-16β-methylpregna-1,4-diene-3,20-dione
- 17.21-dipropionate
