Patient Information

Your patch test results indicate that you have a contact allergy to atronorin. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is atronorin found?

This substance is a component of oak moss and from the lichen variety. It is found in cosmetic products to add fragrance.

How can you avoid contact with atronorin?
