Patient Information

Your patch test result indicates that you have a contact allergy to ferrous sulphate. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is ferrous sulphate found?

Ferrous sulphate is used to fortify foods and treat iron-deficiency anemia. It can also be used to stain concrete. It is used by woodworkers to color maple wood and in horticulture as a lawn conditioner and moss killer. Ferrous sulphate is also used to purify water in industrial sewage treatment plants.

How can you avoid contact with ferrous sulphate?
