MS994: Aminophenazone

Patient Information

Your patch test result indicates that you have a contact allergy to aminophenazone. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is aminophenazone found?

Aminophenazone is a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory agent formerly used to relieve pain associated with neuralgia, rheumatism, and similar painful conditions.

How can you avoid contact with aminophenazone?

Avoid products that list any of the following names in the ingredients:

- aminophenazone
- aminopyrine
- amidopyrine
- aminophen
- amidophen
- dimethylaminophenazone
- 4-dimethylaminoantipyrine
- dipyrine
- amidazophen
- eufibron
- aminofenazone
