EE366: Dimethylaminopropylamine

Patient Information

Your patch test results indicate that you have a contact allergy to dimethylaminopropylamine. This contact allergy may cause your skin to react when it is exposed to this substance although it may take several days for the symptoms to appear. Typical symptoms include redness, swelling, itching, and fluid-filled blisters.

Where is dimethylaminopropylamine found?

Dimethylaminopropylamine is an ingredient found in many personal care products.

How can you avoid contact with dimethylaminopropylamine?
